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
### **PRIMATE ALARM**

Vietnam has with its 25 species and subspecies the highest number of primate groups of the countries located on the Southeast Asian mainland. Five of the species are endemic to Vietnam, and they are also listed among the 25 world's most endangered primates. They are hunted for their meat and fur, bodies used for dubious medicines, and they loose their habitat. Especially langur and magaques

have dwindled to critical numbers which threatens the preservation of these species. It is in an alarming rate. Nowadays much effort is done to breed, research, and conservate endangered primates.

### **WHAT ARE PRIMATES**

The order Primates includes humans, apes, monkeys, and prosimians. Most primates live in tropical or subtropical regions of the Americas, Africa and Asia. They are adapted to live in trees and on the ground. Almost all primates are active during the day and sleep at night. Primates are highly social animals.

Cuc Phuong National Park and Cat Ba
National Park are located in the North East
of Vietnam. Due to unique microclimates in
this long-stretched country; a wide variety
of flora and fauna can be found. These
national parks are especially famous for the
diversity of primate species. 5 species are
endemic to Vietnam.

#### Cat Ba Island

Cat Ba Island is one of the most popular tourist destinations in Vietnam. The government declared the northern part of the island as national park in 1991. The adjacent UNESCO Biosphere Reserve was created to conserve its unique wildlife. Habitat loss is the main threat for the (critically) endangered primates. Also 1) the lack of partnership and commitment with the local communities and 2) the aspirations for development, and due to 3) the steadily increasing human population, 4) severe deficiencies in law enforcement; are causes for decline. As a result, only 65 individuals goldenheaded langur remain in the wild.

Conservation, research & education
In many places in Vietnam increased attention is given to conservation, research, and (environmental) education. Cuc Phuong National Park has a remarkable good visitor

centre. The center has greatly contributed largely to the public's knowledge about Vietnamese primates and their perilous situations. Awareness has been raised in both visitors and local communities. Numerous national and foreign TV programs and newspaper articles have reported on the center's work and the situation of the primates in the wild. Another important tasks of the centre is to educate school children about conservation and nature. A team of conservationists of the Endangered Primate Rescue Center is involved in the conservation and research of the primate species.

Endangered Primate Rescue Center
The Endangered Primate Rescue Center
(EPRC), located at Cuc Phuong National Park,
southwest of Hanoi, is a non-profit
organization dedicated to the rehabilitation,
breeding, research, and conservation of
endangered primates, and to the protection of
their habitats. Established in 1993 it started
with keeping confiscated primates. The final
goal of the EPRC is the establishment of stable
populations of highly endangered primate
species in captivity as a source for further
reintroduction programs. Thanks to many
volunteers and sponsors this project is able to
continue its efforts to safe the primates.
