#### **Problems**

#### What you can do

Instead use the linnen bags. The more you *reduce* your waste the bigger the chance is that it won't stay on the island forever.

A good idea is to *choose* your accomodation carefully. A small guesthouse rather than a resort. An ecological friendly place is preferred. The best thing still is to encourage owners of guesthouses to save water and energy and to promote *recycling*. Putting leaflets all around the place is a good step. Plastic and paper burn easily. Batteries are better of by taking them to mainland. Cans and bottles ususally get a new life. Organic waste does well as compost for the flowers and plants in the garden around the guesthouse.

Rules of not *feeding* animals or consuming endangered species are well known. As is the rule not to bring in plants or animals on an island, since it can disturb the ecosystem. If you decide to go diving or snorkling you can choose reliable business which actively promote their *green policy* to customers. In the next news letter more about this topic.
